From April 2012 to May 2014,, Davidson served as acting director of the Office of Ocean and Coastal Resource Management (OCRM). and played leading role as OCRM and the Coastal Services Center joined forces as a single organization to bring more effective products and services to constituents and coastal communities. As the reorganization received official approval, Ms. Davidson took on the challenge of establishing a newly created position as the NOAA Senior Leader for Coastal Inundation and Resilience.
